Tyonek Tribal Conservation District Updates

This summer, TTCD staff are engaged in continuing ongoing projects as well as beginning new ones. With expansion of the Tyonek Garden, installation of a 30' wide fish friendly culvert, pike derbies, invasive plant surveys, and watershed monitoring, the 2015 field season will be our most active yet!

Tyonek Grown Program

The Tyonek Garden is now in it's fourth year of operation through TTCD's collaboration with the community of Tyonek. In 2015, TTCD's Nicole Swenson continues her role as Garden Manager with the assistance of several youth interns.

The garden officially opened this season with the second annual blessing ceremony on May 14. Participants included Tebughna School, Tyonek Tribal Administrator, USDA NRCS, ANTHC, Ty-onek Health Clinic and community members.

In June, TTCD held our first Tyonek Grown Workshop through funding from the USDA NIFA Beginning Farmers and Ranchers Development Program. The class had 8 participants representing 5 communities: Tyonek, Togiak, Nondalton,

Montana Creek, and Chickaloon. Participants learned about many aspects of gardening.

New at the Tyonek Garden in 2015:

- Garden Expansion: New areas of the garden are now under production, and irrigation system upgrades are underway.
- Volunteer Program: Residents interested in volunteering may redeem hours volunteered for vegetable produce.
- Cooking/Nutrition Lessons: A lesson at the Garden is scheduled for July 15 at 2PM.
- Produce Distribution: Produce will be available at weekly markets, and throughout the week at the Tyonek Tribal Center.

Fish Passage & Habitat Program

Old Tyonek (Robert's) Creek Culvert Replacement

This summer, TTCD is working with the Tyonek Native Corporation (TNC) to remove a fish passage barrier on Old Tyonek (Robert's) Creek. Through generous support from our partners, TTCD has contracted Chumley's and Dowl to install a 30' wide culvert. This project will make over 10 miles of additional habitat available to salmon, benefitting these populations for years to come.

Watershed Plan Updates

TTCD staff are working with our partners to develop a watershed action plan for waterways from Nikolai Creek to Beluga River. TTCD has begun to address issues identified through our planning efforts.

In June, TTCD worked with the Native Village of Tyonek and AK Forum Green Star program to remove 5,000 lbs of lead batteries from Tyonek, a concern identified in Tyonek community meetings. Later this summer, TTCD will also be holding a pike derby in Tyonek and Beluga, conducting a second invasive plant survey, and beginning control efforts on invasive plant populations.

Throughout the summer, TTCD will be involved in watershed monitoring efforts. Monitoring efforts will focus on water quality, stream temperatures, and fish populations. This data will be shared and used for future management decision-making.
